Snapshot - Caroline

- Profound, bilateral deafness since birth
- Hearing-aids by 18 months of age
- Speech therapy began immediately
- Educated to postgraduate level
- Twenty years in digital publishing and marketing



Speech Therapy Background

- Therapist: Mrs Constance Devine (taught 1948-92)
- Started SLT clinic at National Childrens' Hospital
- Believed deaf children benefit most from:
- Typical hearing environment
- Living with families
- Inclusive education



Education Plan From Detection, Onward

- Parent involvement & education
- Constant hearing-aid wear; daily conversations
- Reading books on topics encountered during day
- IEP goals reviewed & extended continuously



What Is Sound Advice?

- Changing mindsets as a disruptive entity
- Website tracks technology for hearing & inclusion
- Seed funding 2007; eGovernment Award 2010
- Inclusive education & living for children & students



Deafness in under-18s

- Two babies are born deaf in Ireland each week
- 90% born to parents without experience of deafness
- 90% are mainstream-educated (3,300+ at present)
- Each deaf child is different
- 19% of hearing teens have hearing loss (earbuds)



The Role of Childcare Providers

- Noticing developmental delays
- Structured play to develop language
- Talking to the child!



Language Teaching – Three Principles

- Early words must be taught if parents absent
- Build spoken language into play
- Frequent one-to-one interaction



Non-Verbal Communication With Babies

- Eye contact and visual interactions
- 'Mirroring' emotions; smile & nod
- Animated facial expressions (peek-a-boo)
- Taking turns and timing your reactions



Communication Triangle (3 to 12 months)

- What is baby looking at?
- 'Mirror' their facial expression, pointing, movements
- Item-and-word link
- The child may bring items for you to name



Multi-Sensory Learning (0 to 12 months)

- Baby visual stimulation cards
- Follow baby's attention and talk
- Changing table toys (name them)
- Teach letters & numbers early



Multi-Sensory Learning (12 to 24 months)

- Picture and item matches
- Washcloth 'books'
- Mirrors and reflections; experience trips
- Letters in different materials




Visual Learning Ideas and Posters

- Books, books and books
- Flash cards with correlating items
- Alphabet dominoes; opposites; shapes; colours
- Gingerbread men for maths and counting
