

Choosing books and toys for Christmas:

2 Golden Rules: No commercial endorsement No batteries

Choosing Christmas presents for young children should be enjoyable, but all too often in these rushed times they become another chore. We want to help you avoid that and savour the time while you are in charge of choosing what your children will find under the tree.

Small children have no sense of value, so what you spend is of no material interest to them and some of the cheapest toys keep the children learning and playing happily for hours.

There are so many ways to choose books and toys that we decided to put them into themes for the various ages to make the choices easier. But you know your own children best, so this is a guide only.

Essential for all small children:

Stacking cups – never too old for them endless hours of enjoyment while they learn about colour, size (big, bigger, biggest etc.), volume, cause and effect relationships. Excellent way to get a child to rise their hair in the bath!

Stocking stuffers:

Bubbles – helps strengthen the muscles we use to form words

Play doh – good for imagination and fine motor skills.

Crayons, paper and (safety) scissors (you can wait until they are three for the scissors) on hand

Balls – great way to get plenty of exercise – small balls work well for small hands, but bigger balls for little feet!
